<ul> <li>Visit Immingham museum</li> <li>In 1874, Great Central Railway conceived the idea to create a port in Immingham.</li> <li>Great Central Railway was privately owned and made money by taking passengers on holiday in the UK.</li> <li>Great Central Railway began transporting cargo to make more money.</li> <li>They conceived the idea of the port to help them transport cargo overseas to make more money.</li> </ul>	1900- A leading marine engineer, Sir John Wolfe Barry publicised the idea. 1904- After some opposition, the Humber Commercial Railway and Dock act was passed (this gave them the go ahead to build the port). Sir John Wolfe Barry then designed the dock.	1906- They started construction of the port. They had a ceremony when they cut the first sod.	1907- As part of the development of the new port some wood framed, corrugated iron clad housing was constructed; several of these survived to the 21st century with one still remaining (visit)	1912- King George V came to open Immingham dock.	1930- By the early 1930s housing development was scattered across several locations: most was along Pelham Road.
