Cons- North South divide, left to fight our own battles against barbarian tribes Previous Learning: In Year 3, children were introduced to the expanding Roman Empire at the end of their Ancient Egyptian study. This prepares them to understand the Romans motives for invading Britain.

Preparing for: Further learning on invaders and settlers later in Year 4. Children also explore the impact of invaders on the people who inhabit a locality, preparing them to explore the relationships between the Pilgrims and the Natives in Year 5 and the impact of, and treatment by, invaders in WW2 as part of their Year 6 learning.
