<p>1607 Members of William Bradford’s congregation In Nottinghamshire were being persecuted because of their religious beliefs. They were Christian purists but felt their religion was not compatible with the Church of England.</p> <p>1607 Failed attempt to flee England from Immingham. The pilgrim monument commemorates this.</p> <p>1608- They manage to escape from England via the River Humber, out into the North Sea and went to the Netherlands where they were able to practice their religion.</p>	<p>1617- John carver, a rich London merchant, began working to get support on founding a new colony in America for the persecuted group.</p> <p>Early 1620- John Carver chartered two ships to take settlers to the New world (North America). The Mayflower and the Speedwell (which was from the Netherlands) set sail from the South Coast of England</p> <p>September 1620: They settled in Plymouth Rock, Massachusetts in North America. These settlers later became known as the pilgrims.</p>	<p>November 1620- They established a document called the Mayflower compact. It set out how the colony should be managed. It was signed by all the male settlers and John Carver was chosen to be the governor for the first year. Each man would build his own shelter and contribute to the building of a town hall. They built a shelter fast as it was now winter.</p> <p>January 1621 Completed town hall</p>	<p>Late January 1621- A harsh winter and a lack of shelter resulted in death and sickness. John Carver became sick during this time.</p>	<p>16th March 1621 Native American called Samoset showed the settlers how to farm. In return, the pilgrims helped him fight off a rival tribe. They became Allies and the colonies formed a peace treaty.</p>	<p>Mid-April 1621 Governor John Carver died. He was replaced by William Bradford.</p> <p>Autumn 1621 The pilgrims celebrated their first harvest. This was the basis for thanksgiving which is celebrated every year on the last Thursday of November in America.</p>

Later in Year 5, children will study North America as part of their Geography learning.</p> <p>Bespoke to us: A significant part of our local History.
